#### JOHN R. ZIMMERMAN

#### GUEST EUPHONIUM SOLOIST



Staff Sergeant John R. Zimmerman, youngest member of the famous United States Marine Band, is a native of New Holland, Pennsylvania. His musical career began in January, 1961, at the age of 13.

Sergeant Zimmerman's progress was so rapid that by his senior year in high school, he had received first place in district band competition four consecutive years and held first chair in the Pennsylvania All-State Band from 1962 through 1965. As a senior, he was first chair euphonium in the All-Eastern Band held in Buffalo, New York. During this time, he was not only gaining recognition on euphonium but on trombone as well.

In 1963, at the age of 15, Sergeant Zimmerman auditioned for and was accepted by the United States Marine Band. He enlisted in June, 1965 and made his first solo appearance with the band at the Water Gate, Washington, D. C., two months later.

Since then, Sergeant Zimmerman has appeared as soloist with the band in numerous concerts. He was also given the honor of stand-by soloist on the Marine Band's tour of the United States last Fall. Other guest appearances have included public schools throughout Washington, D. C., Pennsylvania and Maryland. Just recently, he performed as guest soloist with the Central District Band held in State College.

#### ALAN WYAND, BAND DIRECTOR

Our dedicated and enthusiastic band director was born in State College, Pennsylvania and received both his Baccalaureate and Masters Degrees in Music Education from the Pennsylvania State University.

In addition to other collegiate activities, Mr. Wyand was a member and officer of the Penn State Blue Band, organized and led a dance orchestra, and toured nine European countries with the University Chapel Choir.

Just recently, Mr. Wyand was selected as one of ten high school band directors from the United States to be honored this year by the SCHOOL MUSICIAN Magazine for his outstanding work in the field of instrumental music education. A picture and article appear in the April issue. He was further honored this past summer by induction into the American School Band Directors Association, a select group of band directors from throughout the United States.

Mr. Wyand is a life member of the P.S.E.A. and N.E.A., charter member of the National Band Association, a member of the Pennsylvania Music Educators Association, the Pennsylvania Bandmasters Association, and the Music Educators National Conference.

Honorary societies to his credit include Phi Beta Mu, National Bandmasters Fraternity (past president of Pennsylvania Chapter); Phi Delta Kappa, Honorary Education Fraternity; and Phi Mu Alpha, Honorary Music Fraternity.



In addition, Mr. Wyand is a member of the National Board of Representatives for the School Band of America, a European touring band associated with the People-to-People Program. He was recently appointed National Editor for Phi Beta Mu and has news articles appearing monthly in a professional journal.

Mr. Wyand has gained national recognition through the publication of his manual, "Band Training Camps". He has attracted state and national attention to the activities of the West York music program through the appearances of guest artists and the tours of our various musical groups.

## The Instrumental Music Parent's Club

The Instrumental Music Parent's Club was organized in July of 1956. Its purpose is "to arouse and maintain an enthusiastic interest in the various phases of instrumental music in the West York Area Schools". Membership is open to anyone interested in the progress and development of instrumental music in the West York Area Schools.

The officers and members of the club wish to thank the residents of the community for their continued support of the group's activities. Past projects have included the purchase of new uniforms, new instruments and miscellaneous band equipment; sponsorship of the John Philip Sousa Band Award; a \$200.00 music camp scholarship; partial payment of a summer band training encampment; preparation and serving of the annual band banquet; and help in transporting and chaperoning numerous band trips and social functions. Funds for current year's projects have been raised through a theater party, bake sale, magazine sales and the annualSpring Concert souvenir program.

The main projects for the present year are to raise funds for new instruments, for the Albert Kelly Memorial Summer Camp Scholarship, and for the eighth annual band trainingencampment planned for late August 1967. A three-day concert tour is also planned for May 4, 5, and 6 to East Stroudsburg, Pennsylvania.

### "OUR YEAR IN REVIEW"



The 1966-67 Senior Band year was again inaugurated at Camp Nawakwa with a week of marching, drilling, routines, and music rehearsal in preparation for the oncoming football season. Hot August days set a blazing pace for "out of shape" seniors and "softie" rookies, as Mr. Wyand and his faithful henchmen strove for perfection. This year saw another addition to Mr. Wyand's renown scar collection as well as the renaming of a certain senior cabin, "J-S. . ?!" The famed "rookie day" with its delectable Bulldog feast went extremely well with only a few rookies reporting for sick bay the next day.

Again this year there seemed to have arisen a slight competition between the color guard and the band. A tug of war between the guard and the band saw the band emerge victorious, which only succeeded in increasing the fervor of "Bud and his troops." And, of course, the band seemed to lose one of its tubas (permanently) much to the dismay of Mr. Wyand. The much sought after whisk broom award went to cabin J-I as the band morale remained its usual high. The week was full of fun as well as hard work.

With the arrival of football season, the marching band performed its all new routines which included "Salute to Bands", "Variety Show", "Homecoming Show" and the "Salute to New York" with its invigorating chorus line. This year the Buulldog Band was extremely proud of its band front. The majorettes, under the leadership of head majorette, Sandy List, instructed by Dianne Smith, and coached by the male members of the band, added spice and variety to the shows. For the second consecutive year the band had as its drum major, Fred Klinedinst. Coached by Charlie Rosebrock (drum major from Penn State Blue Band), Fred did a great job in leading the band on the field. The color guard, with color sergeant Al Livingston, remained the band's pride even though they didn't let the guard know it. Again this year the combined performance of the Bulldog Band and the Red Lion Band was well liked by everyone.





This year also signified the second year of publication for the "Snoop", a weekly courier of cheer and joy, published to maintain band morale and provide general information. Under the auspices of Fred Klinedinst and John Stitt, the "Snoop" was again eagerly sought after by the band members as well as some interested teachers.

For the third consecutive year the grandeur of our color guard won them first place in competition held in Frederick, Maryland. They also captured first prize in competition at Gettysburg. The band congratulates the guard and their capable leader, Bud Schlosser, for a job well done.

Besides performing at the many football games, the band also played at many of the pep

rallies and marched in the Halloween Parade where they received quite a compliment from WORK radio. A potluck supper, featuring the Apollos, ended the football season. The highlight of the evening was a volleyball game between the color guard and the band. Again the band proved its superiority by beating the guard in 2 out of 3 games and the prodigious color guard was subjected to 50 push-ups under the supervision of Mr. Toggas.

With the arrival of December came District Band tryouts at Palmyra High School. This year West York set a

new all-time record for the number of students qualifying for the festival from one school, as 26 Bulldog Bandsmen qualified out of over a thousand participants. After journeying to Hanover High School, they spent three days of fun and hard work under the admired and distinguished "Colonel Gabriel" (Comm. U.S.A.F. Band.) Those selected to represent the West York Band were: Don Burkins, Stu Cluck, Sue Crowl, Tim Day, Don Emig, John Grumbine, Bob Hubbard, Don Kern, Jeff Kindig, Mike Knight, Sue Kohler, Ron Miller, Dennis Mulligan, Sue Neiser, Steve Owen, Ron Rutland, Herb Senft, Tom Slaney, Greg Smith, Charley Stambaugh, Rick Strausbaugh, Tom Turnbull, Dave Winter, Charles Wisner, Bob Young and Tom Zemaitis.

For the second consecutive year, Tom Turnbull was selected for concertmeister, an honor both for himself and West York. A total of eight first chairs were held by our band. This year too, West York was honored by having four of its band members participating in Regional Band. Herb Senft, Tom Slaney, Greg Smith, and Tom Turnbull traveled to Central Dauphin High School in Harrisburg where they played under guest conductor Mr. Al Flock from

Bucknell University.

The holiday season approached quickly and with it came the annual Christmas Concert featuring the band and choruses. During this season the brass choir played concerts at Shiloh Lions Club, St. Paul's E. C. Church, and West York Optimist Christmas Party. Caroling was a huge success this year, as members of our brass sections played throughout the community and in several convalescent homes and ended up at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Raymond Roth for homemade ice cream and fellowship.

Our numerous ensembles were again unusually active. Organized this year were a brass choir and a woodwind quintet. Among recitals played by these two groups were a clinic and concert at Gettysburg College and Susquehanna University, as well as numerous school, church and civic organizations. Also this year, fifteen members of the band went to Philadelphia to hear the Philadelphia Orchestra and to meet with members of this famed group afterwards.

With the advent of the new year came preparation for West York's first all-school show, "South Pacific". This musical was presented to a standing room only crowd both evenings and starred Dave Rhodes and Jeanette Young. A pit band opened the show and played between acts.

Along with the new year and "South Pacific" came hard preparation for our annual Spring Concert. This year the band contracted John Zimmerman, a euphonium virtuoso with the United States Marine Band. Sgt. Zimmerman

is a local Pennsylvania boy (hailing from Lancaster county and participating in several local District Band Festivals a few years ago) and is not only the Marine Band's soloist, but is also the youngest member of the Band. He plans to spend two or three days with us, working closely with the brass sections of the band. Again this year the band spent two evenings with "take five" Frank Taylor, who recorded and will produce the record of the concert. Dr. James Dunlop, director of bands at Penn State, again honored the band with his presence in preparation for this evenings concert.

A new pass off system was initiated this year. Each person in the section of the band which meets the requirements first will receive an extra point toward his band pin; and each section leader will dubiously receive the "connoisseur's delight"—a spa-

ghetti dinner by Mr. Wyand.

Talent in the band this year is at a peak. The Bulldog Band not only enjoys some of the finest musicians around, but also has more than its share of participants in sports and extra-curricular activities. A large percent of the band members are honor students and almost half of the band members have participated in one school sport or another. Many of the leads in numerous school plays, including "South Pacific", have gone to bandsmen,

and two local and well-known rock & roll groups are represented in the band. (In a different sort of talent, there is question as to whether Mike Ellis can retain his championship in the make-it-yourself banana split contest to be held

at our party at Lincolnway Fire Hall following the concert.)

Our executive committee whose function, besides carrying out regular designated duties, is to direct and administer band policy was again excellent. This group, along with Mr. Wyand, has planned the party to be held this evening, band camp, pot-luck supper and fun-night, and our present awards system.

Touring is the most exciting part of the band's activities. This year a three way exchange will be held. Early in May, the Bulldog Band will journey to East Stroudsburg for three days. While there, we will perform a student concert and a public concert on Friday evening featuring both bands. We will also visit points of interest and attend parties at our hosts homes. Two weeks later, West York will in turn be host to Springford High School near Philadelphia for a similar exchange.

This year the band will perform numerous student assemblies here at the school to demonstrate the sections within the band. Also, we will travel to Hannah Penn Junior High School to present an afternoon concert there.

The Instrumental Music Parents Club is again sponsoring and preparing for the annual Band Banquet to be held May 12. All parents are invited to witness the presentation of awards to band members and our special entertainment.

Finishing off the year, a full one at that, will be an outdoor concert at Shiloh, Memorial Day, and Lions Convention Parade, and of course, Commencement.

The band and Mr. Wyand would like to express their deep gratitude to the Instrumental Music Parents Club and all individuals and organizations who supported the "Bulldog Band" throughout the year. Thanks again for helping make this an enjoyable and long-to-be-remembered year.





Students are selected for "Tri-M" membership on the basis of musicianship, scholarship, character, cooperation, leadership, and service to the school, church, and community.

Although primarily an honor society, the West York Chapter has sponsored several projects. In addition to an impressive initiation ceremony, the society has also held a series of solo and ensemble recitals and arranged a field trip to hear the Philadelphia Orchestra. Highlight of the trip was personally meeting key members of the orchestra.



ing four of its members selected for Regional Band. Tim Day, Tom Slaney, Charles Stambaugh, and Rick Strausbaugh were selected to travel to Pottsgrove High School, Pottstown, for a three day festival the end of April.

The rest of the morning was spent in tryouts and seating. After lunch, the students assembled on stage for an afternoon and evening of rehearsal. Thursday evening, after rehearsal, the students met their respective hosts for the three days. Bright and early Friday morning, the young musicians returned for more practice, That afternoon a concert was given for the school. Friday night the band played a concert before a "packed house". After the concert a dance featuring "The Apollos" was held for the band members. Saturday morning, after a full night's sleep (?), the band returned for a final rehearsal. That afternoon free bowling and a bus to downtown York were provided. After the traditional banquet Saturday evening, the students played again before a "packed house". Guest conductor for this event was Dr. James Dunlop, Director of Bands at Penn State. Soloist for the festival was Mr. James Burke, cornet virtuoso.

Along with the new year came also preparation for West York's all-school show, "My Fair Lady". This musical was presented to "standing room only" crowds all three evenings. A pit band opened the show and played between acts.

This year the West York band was chosen to appear in a national publication, "The First Chair of America" Year-book. Published each year, the book salutes outstanding high school bands from every state. Released in May, it will feature pictures of West York's concert band, first chair players, band front, and student officers.

Throughout, and in addition to all the other activities, the band was preparing for its annual Spring Concert. This year the band is featuring as its soloists two of our own members. Ed Mummert, a percussion student since grade school, will present a solo written for snare drum and band accompaniment. Tom Turnbull, who was just recently accepted at one of the top music schools in the country, will present a clarinet solo. The band is extremely proud of these two talented musicians. Again this year the band spent two evenings with "take five" Frank Taylor, who recorded and will produce the record of this concert.

Our executive committee whose function, besides carrying out regularly designated duties, is to direct band policy was again excellent. Along with Mr. Wyand, this group has planned the party to be held this evening, band camp, pot-luck supper, and our present award system. In addition this year, the committee has been publishing a news letter each month which is sent to all band alumni. Under the auspices of Carol Landis, this letter has been well received and appreciated. (If there are any band alumni in the audience this evening who have not received this letter, please contact Carol or Mr. Wyand so that we can get our mailing list up to date.)

Touring is the most exciting part of the band activities. This year the band is extremely delighted to be traveling "out of the country" to St. Catharine's, Ontario, Canada. While guests of our Canadian hosts, we will play a concert for the student body and a public concert Friday evening. We will also visit points of interest (including Niagara Falls) and attend parties at our host's homes. This past March the band hosted the St. Catharine's Group in York while on their way to North Carolina.

The Instrumental Music Parents Club is again sponsoring and preparing for the annual Band Banquet to be held in May. All parents are invited to witness the presentation of awards to band members and our special entertainment.

Finishing off our year will be an outdoor concert at Shiloh, Memorial Day Parade, and Commencement.

The band and Mr. Wyand would like to express their deepest gratitude to the Instrumental Music Booster Club and to all individuals and organizations who supported the "Bulldog Band" throughout the year. Thanks again for helping make this an enjoyable and long-to-be-remembered year.







and committee work. Thus, in January, 1960, a system of student government was adopted.


Each officer and staff member has assigned duties and obligations which he must perform in order for the band to function smoothly. In addition, the executive committee meets at irregular intervals to discuss band



Students are selected for "Tri-M" membership on the basis of musicianship, scholarship, character, cooperation, leadership, and service to the school, church, and community.

Although primarily an honor society, the West York Chapter has sponsored several projects. In addition to an impessive initiation ceremony, the society has also held several solo and ensemble recitals and arranged field trips to hear the Philadelphia Orchestra. Highlight of the trips was personally meeting key members of the orchestra.
