


Five Year Enrollment History






STUDENT ENROLLMENT 2019-20

- 720 HS students were enrolled in Honors Courses.
- 82 HS students were enrolled in AP Courses.
- 15 HS student were enrolled in College in HS Courses.
- 43.3% of MS students were on Honor Roll.
- 44.8% of HS students were on Honor Roll.
- 10 seniors were honorees as Superintendent's Summa Cum Laude recipients (GPA 98% for HS career).
- 50 students experienced homelessness.
- 546 students received special education support services.
- 121 students received gifted support services.
- 20 different languages were represented across our student population as the primary language spoken in the home.



English Learners Enrollment


(Number of Students Active/Monitored*)

CAREER & COLLEGE READINESS 2019-20

Career and College Readiness is a K-12 initiative where students are exposed to a variety of careers and skills at all levels to prepare students for future success.

Note: Due to COVID-19 closures and cancellations, several programs, such as the annual West York Job Fair, were canceled.

- York County Alliance for Learning (YCAL) Career Exploration Program 15 students participated in the YCAL Career Exploration Programs and some students participated in multiple programs.
- Apprenticeship Programs The goal for each program is hands-on experience in various trade fields. One student completed the Kinsley's Pre-Apprenticeship program and was hired upon graduation.
- Harrisburg Area Community College (HAAC) Academy 15 students took HACC
 Academy courses (7 students took Nurse's Aide, 5 took Auto Tech, 3 took Welding).
- Penn State Educational Opportunity Center PSEOC, a federal program dedicated to aiding individuals in furthering their education, sent a counselor regularly throughout the school year to meet with five seniors who qualified for this program.
- Junior Achievement
 - Middle School: Students participated in the YES (Your Economic Success)
 Program, where students rotate through various stations to learn about
 various career readiness skills such as entrepreneurship, teamwork, and
 finances.
 - High School: 10th grade students participated in the JA STEM Summit where they explore STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Math) careers.
 11th grade students participate in JA Real Life where local business leaders present topics such as finance, budgeting, and future planning.







DISTRICT ACHIEVEMENTS 2019-20

- **Scholarships** 39 of our 186 graduates received scholarships, including several from the West York Foundation totaling \$39,600.
- 77% of graduating seniors went on to 2- or 4-year colleges.
- Middle School Future City group won the Best City Layout at the Future City Competition on Jan. 25th at the State Museum in Harrisburg.
- Ms. Amy Wiker (High School) and Ms. Christine McKee (Lincolnway) were recipients of 2019-20 Outstanding Teacher Awards, sponsored by the Shippensburg University Superintendent Study Council.
- **Ten** Seniors were honored as **Superintendent's Summa Cum Laude** recipients having maintained a GPA of 98 or higher for their high school career.
- Student Council's Mini-thon raised \$19,840.28. Due to COVID-19 closures, Student Council was not able to host a Mini-THON in 2019-20. Funds raised in 2019-20 came from private and student donations. Four Diamonds supports families of children with cancer through Penn State Children's Hospital.
- Model UN—Students, referred to as Delegates, simulate proceedings of the United Nations. They are each assigned a country to represent in one of the UN's numerous committees with pre-set topics to debate.

- Fund Balance Utilization- 1% Includes funds needed to offset budget expenditures.




STUDENT NUTRITION 2019-20

Proper nutrition is important to student growth and development. The West York Area School District is committed to ensuring all students have access to healthy meals at school.

- Summer breakfast/lunch meals were served through August 2020 due to the COVID-19 closure.
 - 52,256 "Summer" meals were served March through August
 - Out of the 52,256 meals, 16,292 were served from June through August

In promoting student health, the District provides free or reduced price meals for students who qualify in compliance with Federal and State regulations.

• Prior to the COVID-19 closure, 1,493 students received free/reduced meals. This is a 3% decrease from the 2018-2019 school year.

NOTE: Due to the COVID-19 closure, NSLP stats are missing March through June sales. Additionally, the Federal government changed the criteria regarding benefits for the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) program in 2019-20 which effected the Free and Reduced numbers in the District. Less students were certified for SNAP approval.







STUDENT WELLNESS 2019-20

- The WY Flu Shot Clinic administered 334 flu shots in the Fall of 2019.
- Mental/Emotional Support initiatives:
 - Student Assistance Program (SAP) at the Elementary and Secondary school buildings.
 - School counselors offered group and individual counseling
 - K-Pets at Lincolnway and Wallace
 - Safe2Say Something
- Take home lunches were provided to students on early dismissals if requested
- The Bulldog Pantry, a non-perishable food center located in the High School, is open to all District families, kindergarten through 12th-grade. We served approximately 61 families each time the Pantry was open.
- Bev's Blessings Food Distribution Ninety-three (93)
 Wallace/Lincolnway families on our free/reduced lunch list received a backpack of food each Friday for the children to have additional food for the weekend
- The District and West York Community participated in a national "Be the Light" campaign to boost morale for graduating seniors
